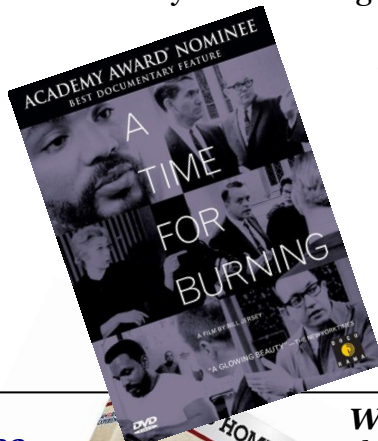

A Time for Burning is an Academy Award nominated documentary film which explores the attempts of a Lutheran minister in Omaha, Nebraska, to persuade his all-white congregation to reach out to the African-American Lutherans in the city. This is a classic touchstone, which captures the mood of the times as the Civil Rights Movement challenged the nation to change its ways.

We Shall Remain: Wounded Knee chronicles the stand-off between Oglala Sioux and American Indian Movement activists and federal law enforcement on the Pine Ridge Reservation in 1973. It examines the political and economic forces that led to the emergence of AIM and the events that triggered the takeover. The event succeeded in bringing the desperate conditions of Indian reservation life to the nation's attention.
