In the wake of recent events that have sparked a national dialogue on race dynamics. **American Denial** explores the impact of unconscious biases around race and class, using Gunnar Myrdal's investigation of Jim Crow racism. Swedish researcher and Nobel Laureate Gunnar Myrdal whose study, An American Dilemma (1944), provided a provocative inquiry into the dissonance between stated beliefs and what is perpetuated and allowed in the name of those beliefs. His inquiry into the United States' racial psyche becomes a lens for modern inquiry into how denial, cognitive dissonance, and unrecognized, unconscious attitudes continue to dominate racial dynamics in American life.
